



Photo Editing Guide

Each distribution Against Malaria provides with bednets is obliged to send us photographic evidence of the distribution. We use these photos on the site to illustrate the distribution. A good example of this is shown here: <http://www.againstmalaria.com/Distribution.aspx?DistributionID=231>

The photos should 'tell the story' of the distribution: i.e. nets being driven/delivered to location, any talks or demonstrations, people waiting, receiving nets (being ticked off a list, signing a document or handing over vouchers), people leaving, nets hung in homes/schools/hospitals.

Typically there may be up to 100 photos covering a distribution. These will be uploaded to a photo sharing site and a username/password given to the volunteer. They can then log in and edit the photos down to between 20 and 40 captioned and ordered photos. Volunteers can either edit the photos online or (if they have the correct software) they can download the album, edit it and then upload the result. When finished we can then upload those photos to the appropriate distribution on our own site.

Ideally we like to aim for a quick turn around as we have images to process and more are coming in all the time. It is good to get the pictures uploaded to a distribution as soon as we can so people get quick feedback on where their money went. We also list the names of volunteers, with your permission, on our Thank You page as well.
